What is results language?

Definition: Words we use to say the product of another thing

Example:

Mr Green has diabetes. Consequently, he is taking medication

- As result of
- Consequently
- Due to
- Resulting

Resulting in + noun*	A car crash resulting in an admission to hospital		

- 1. Mr Smith had a severe allergic reaction to the medication, $\underline{\text{which resulted in}}$ administra $\underline{\text{tion}}$ epinephrine immediately.
- 2. The surgeon performed a successful operation, resulting in him recovering rapidly.
- 3. Smoking is a major risk factor for lung cancer, and <u>due to this</u> it is essential to quit smoking to reduce the risk.
- 4. Mrs Jones experienced severe dehydration, as a result of a lack of proper fluid intake during a marathon.
- 5. The new treatment had <u>significant side effects</u>, resulting in the decision to discontinue its use.
- 6. Obesity is a growing concern worldwide, as a result of an increased risk of diabetes and heart disease.
- 7. Lack of exercise and poor diet can lead to obesity, which resulted in various health problems.
