5.	Why am I writing today?	patient ready for discharge
6.	Is it urgent?	no

On 19 May, Mr England presented with lower back and generalised abdominal pain along with a pulsing sensation. His CT-scan confirmed his diagnosis. Consequently, an urgent open stent graft surgery was initiated. He was treated accordingly, his wound was dressed and IV antibiotic was commenced. In addition, he was placed on in an upright position and observed for breathing difficulties as he was at risk for DVT. Currently, he has made good progress as evident by his normal vital signs.

Consequently, Mr England underwent urgent open stent graft surgery.

Regarding Mr England's nursing management, an <u>Indwelling Foley catheter was inserted</u>. His wound was drained, along with Mepore dressing on the surgical site. <u>Patient-controlled analgesia was commenced</u>, as well as IV antibiotics. Additionally, he needed to be observed for DVT risk and breathing. Upon assessment, his vital signs were normal.

In both of the paragraphs here I feel there is <u>too</u> much information.

This is very well written but a lot of the detail isn't necessary for the reader to understand the situation and do their job properly. Much more detail is required in following paragraph. If you write in this much detail throughout your letter, it will go to 300 words.

- Be careful with your use of linking words
- Overall, good language use well done!

He has been instructed to achieve an optimal weight by reducing his intake of alcohol, fatty food and salty food and increasing intake of dietary fibre. Additionally, he was encouraged to gradually increase gentle exercise but to avoid non-weight bearing for 6 weeks and driving for 4 weeks. He will be continued taking low-dose of aspirin after discharged.

Today, Mr England has been given discharge advice on the necessary lifestyle changes. He has been instructed to achieve an optimal weight by reducing his intake of alcohol, fatty food and salty food and increasing his intake of dietary fibre. Additionally, he has been encouraged to gradually increase gentle exercise. He has been advised to avoid non-weight-bearing and strenuous exercise for 6 weeks and driving for 4 weeks. Additionally, he has been instructed with necessary lifestyle changes, such as, decreasing alcohol consumption, fatty and salty foods but increasing foods rich-in-fiber. He has also been given education on achieving and maintaining optimal weight. Please note that he will be discharged with a low-dosage aspirin.

Mr England has been advised to avoid driving for 4 weeks and weight-bearing and strenuous exercise for 6 weeks. However, he should increase gentle exercise gradually. Additionally, he has been instructed on necessary lifestyle changes, such as decreasing his consumption of alcohol and fatty and salty foods but increasing fibre-rich foods. He has also been given education on achieving and maintaining his optimal weight. Please note that he will be discharged with a low-dosage aspirin.

Mr England has been advised to decrease his alcohol intake and to avoid consuming animal fats, fried foods, as well as salt. He has also been instructed on the importance of adding more fibre in his diet and maintaning his optimal weight which is wanted to achieve. Additionally, he has been recommended about doing exercise gently also refrained from doing weight bearing exercise. As well as that, he has been recomended for refraining from driving. He has been prescribed low-dosage aspirin.

Mr England has been advised to decrease his alcohol intake and to avoid consuming animal fats, fried foods, and salt. He has also been instructed on the importance of adding more fibre to his diet and maintaining his optimal weight which is wanted to achieve. Additionally, he has been advised to exercise gently and to refrain from doing weight-bearing and strenuous exercise for six weeks.
