

18th June 2024 Language – Past Perfect Simple and Past Perfect Continuous

Look at these two sentences:

When Ms Demir presented on 3rd December, she had fully recovered from the surgery.

When Ms Demir presented on 3rd December, she had been recovering from the surgery for three days.

What <u>differences</u> do you notice in terms of language and meaning?

Past Perfect Simple had + third form (past participle)	Past Perfect Continuous had + been + verb + ing
Usually focuses on the completion of an action	Usually indicates that the action was still happening at the time of another past action OR
	Usually focuses on the duration of a past action which happened before another past action
Usually focuses an action that happened one time:	Usually focus on an action that happened on a number on occasions:
"Mr Greene visited the clinic last week and told me that he had lost 2kg in weight."	"Mr Greene visited the clinic last week and told me that he had been exercising every day."
We can use with both action and non-action verbs:	We can only use with action verbs:
"Mr Greene visited the clinic last week and told me that he had exercised the day before."	"Mr Greene visited the clinic last week and told me that he had been exercising every day."
"Mrs Iqbal reported that she had had the pain for the previous 5 days."	"Mrs Iqbal reported that she had been having the pain for the previous 5 days."
