Of course, it's prepositions!

They are the small words that we use in English to do a lot of things.

They are everywhere!

### Here's some information about them:

- Prepositions can change the meaning of a sentence: they tell us how, when, where things happen
- We generally follow prepositions with nouns, with the exception of 'to' when the infinitive is being used
- Prepositions are often collocated with specific nouns, verbs and adjectives
- With different forms of the same root word we find patterns of prepositions: addicted to / addiction to
- We also can see some patterns with similar word meanings: scared of /terrified of/afraid of
- Words can have multiple collocations with different prepositions this affects the meaning:
   Shout at (angry) / Shout to (get someone's attention)
- Words can have multiple meanings for the same collocation: put out (put something outside your house / stop a fire from burning/ annoy somebody)

In this class we'll look at putting verbs and prepositions together. Below is an exercise that deals with common verb + preposition collocations.

<sup>\*</sup>Collocate means 'put together with'
