## Starter:

#### Some information about nouns...

- Nouns are always subjects or objects in sentences
- Nouns can be more than one word we call this a compound noun or a noun phrase
- Nouns can be gerunds verb + ing

#### Examples:

'Swimming' can be a verb...

Verb: I am swimming. (subject + be + verb + ing)

But it can also be a noun...

- **Gerund: Swimming** is good for you / A good exercise is swimming.
- Noun phrase:

Subject: Swimming in the sea is dangerous.

**Object:** I tell people to avoid swimming in the sea

• **Compound noun: Freshwater swimming is** good for you.

## Exercise 1

## What are these sentences describing?

- 1) the woman who gave birth to my wife: **mother-in-law**
- 2) a house which has been painted green / a place to grow flowers: greenhouse
- a tool you use for blood to enter and leave the body: blood syringe / intravenous cannula / dialysis machine / blood transfusion set
- 4) a place where you catch trains in London / a place which is below the surface of earth: underground / train station
- 5) what you wear to protect your eyes in summer: sunglasses
- 6) where you sit comfortably to watch TV: living room / comfy chair / armchair / sitting room

**Compound nouns with numbers:** 

Don't pluralise the noun inside a compound noun

Do use a hyphen between the number and the noun

- Mr Smith went on holiday for 3 weeks.
- Mr Smith had a three-week holiday.
- My baby was born 6 months ago.
- I have a six-month-old baby.
- The project I am working on will last for 3 years.
- *I am working on a three-year project.*
