2. (Adjective) Having many different aspects or facets.

3. (Verb) To agree or be in harmony with someone or something.

12. (Adjective) New or original; not previously known or experienced.

The researcher proposed a novel approach to treating Alzheimer's disease using gene therapy.

13. (Verb) To discover or reveal something previously unknown or hidden.

The study enabled researchers to <u>unearth</u> new evidence supporting the link between diet and cardiovascular health.

14. (Adjective) Strong, healthy, and vigorous; characterized by resilience or strength.

Regular exercise contributes to a robust immune system and overall well-being.

15. (Noun) The possibility or likelihood of something happening in the future.
