CRITERIA	HOW CAN WE MEET IT?
C1 – <mark>Sequencing</mark> the interview purposefully and logically	<ul> <li>We can use sequencing in explanations or summarising: "Firstly", "Secondly", "Lastly", "Finally"</li> <li>We follow the task card – don't change the order of the bullet points</li> </ul>
C2 – <mark>Signposting</mark> changes in topic	<ul> <li>We use phrases to indicate to the patient that we are going to change topic in the conversation:</li> <li>"Now, I would (us) to talk about your treatment. Is that ok?"</li> <li>"Now, let's discuss your management plan"</li> <li>"Ok, after discussing your medication, let me show you how it works"</li> <li>"Can/Could we discuss your medication?"</li> <li>"I would like to explain more about your treatment"</li> <li>"Shall we move on and talk about your symptoms?"</li> <li>"Now that we have discussed your symptoms, can we move (on) to the examination findings?"</li> </ul>
C3 – Using organising techniques in explanations	<ul> <li>Categorisation (menu technique)</li> <li>"First, we discuss your symptoms and then we will talk about your diagnosis"</li> <li>"Before we discuss your test results, I would like to ask you some questions about your symptoms. Is that alright?"</li> <li>Summarising</li> <li>We choose two or three important things that we want the patient to remember after the conversation and summarise the information</li> <li>"To sum up"</li> <li>"Today, we have discussed"</li> <li>Chunking</li> <li>We take a large piece of information and we break it into smaller manageable pieces with pauses and checking questions between each chunk</li> <li>Labelling</li> <li>We put emphasis on something that we think is very important for the patient</li> <li>"It is vital/crucial/imperative/important/essential for you to avoid drinking alcohol"</li> <li>"It would be beneficial for you to make some changes to your diet"</li> </ul>
