### Starter

Change the sentences below into the passive voice

Think about tense or form...

- 1. People use computers in most offices Computers are used in most offices – present simple
- The maid will clean the room
  The room will be cleaned (by the maid) future simple
- 3. Workmen were digging up the road The road was being dug up – Past continuous
- 4. The staff are tidying the classroom The classroom is being tidied (by the staff) – Present continuous
- 5. The police have caught the criminal The criminal has been caught – present perfect simple
- 6. The boss had found the employee stealing money The employee had been found stealing money – past perfect simple
- 7. James Cameron directed 'Avatar'
  'Avatar' was directed by James Cameron past simple
- 8. Care workers need to assist my grandfather My grandfather needs to be assisted by care workers – infinitive form
- Teachers should teach the students
  The students should be taught bare infinitive
- 10. I hate somebody waking me up when I'm asleep I hate being woken up – gerund form

## In OET writing we might use...

- Present simple
- Present perfect simple
- Past simple
- Past perfect (maybe)
- Future simple
- Infinitive form "needs to be monitored"
- Bare infinitive form "should be monitored"



### What are the missing words in these sentences?

The food which/that is eaten by British people is high in carbohydrates.

The students who/that are taught by Laurence are in the main Zoom room.

In more natural English, we often omit the relative pronoun and the verb 'to be':

The food eaten by British people is high in carbohydrates.

The students taught by Laurence are in classroom 10.

This is called a reduced relative clause

- 1. The fruit which was sold in this shop was totally organic.
- 2. The man who is called Simon works in London.
- 3. The shops which are owned by Mr Samuel are very profitable.
- 4. The people who were spoken to were happy about the proposals.

When we omit the verb 'to be' how do we know the tense of the sentence?
