Look at the text below and try to understand the meaning of the <u>highlighted</u> words by using the context:

Today, I would like to discuss a dermatology patient. This patient presented with an **offensive** smell emanating from a wound on their foot and pain **ascending** up the lower leg. Despite **superior** means of wound care being employed, the patient was experiencing **stinging** sensations around the site. The healthcare team was initially **in doubt** about the aetiology of the odour, suspecting a possible infection. However, upon examination, it was found that a foreign body was **in situ** within the wound, thereby exacerbating the discomfort.

It was decided that the <u>sole</u> method to address the issue was to allow additional time to <u>elapse</u> for the wound to heal, with <u>residual</u> symptoms expected during the recovery process. <u>In collaboration with</u> wound care specialists, the patient's treatment plan was adjusted to include <u>jointly</u> administered antibiotics and <u>timely</u> wound debridement. The healthcare team worked <u>in liaison with</u> the patient to ensure proper wound care at home and scheduled regular follow-up appointments to monitor progress.

Despite these efforts, it was determined that the foreign body had <u>irreparably</u> damaged surrounding tissue. As a result, the decision was made to <u>summon</u> the patient for surgical removal of the foreign object. Following the procedure, the wound was <u>shut off</u> from further contamination, and the patient was provided with appropriate post-operative care to promote healing and prevent complications.
